Winter fest ~ which is being planned for February 21-24. Activities will be ice fishing, snowshoeing, cook out, sled rides, and more.

Spring fast ~ date to be determined. This is where you return to the land and connect with nature. Renew yourself and listen to teachings and song.





Community week ~ week before pow wow. There is activity planned to help engage members to enjoy each other company, have fun and learn new things.

Moose Camp ~ date to be determined. Week long event, with lots to do. Come out to camp as a community, sit around fire drink tea, share stories. Hunting crews, are made up to go out and harvest a moose bring back to community and process together to pack and clean it. Last year have a menu of traditional meals was a good idea. So each day, we plan to do the same.

The team has started with the Education department to bring more cultural awareness and land base activities for the students. It's a learning curve for everyone. Once anyone steps on to the land they feel totally different from being in a building. Nature takes over, and it's an experience you can not explain.

This department will support families through child welfare



matters. They are a resource for on reserve matters as well as off reserve.

They provide advocacy and support to Pic Mobert families who become involved with a Children's Aid Society (CAS) to ensure that the rights of our children and families are respected by CAS.

The Band Representative is a legal party to the proceedings that are before the court in child protection matters on behalf of Pic Mobert and are there for the best interest of our children.

Band representatives are available to Netmizaaggamig Nishnaabeg members located both on and off reserve.

Band Representatives will work to ensure that our children are not displaced from our strong and vibrant community.

Often participating in outreach and repatriation services as well as customary care process and CAS agency home visits.

Your band representative will advocate and mediate in a supportive role to assist parents in developing healthy plans for their children and family.

ISN Maskwa



Owned by Missanabie Cree First Nation, ISN Maskwa is Canada's first Indigenous Emergency Operations Centre (IEOC) and a leader in training and deploying teams into Indigenous communities for a variety of specialties.



Established in November of 2020, ISN Maskwa has been working extensively to build on the concept of an "Indigenous-led Community Support" with regards to evacuation and emergency response. The ISN Maskwa team strives to establish and build upon many meaningful relationships with First Nations, Metis and Inuit leaders and communities across the province of Ontario.

In February 2022 ISN Maskwa deployed a team into Pic Mobert First Nation to provide support with a focus on promoting community safety and well-being. The team remains in-community and is comprised of a Manager, an on the ground Supervisor and our trained Community Support Personnel (CSP).



The ISN Maskwa team, with assistance from a speciality trained consultant in community safety and well-being, has been engaging community members, service providers and leadership to identify priority areas and new initiatives to further promote safety and wellbeing for all. Because of the unique approach of engaging the community and asking what they require, ISN Maskwa has been able to deliver services to address community needs in the areas of social development, prevention, and risk-intervention that mitigated and improved the crisis situation that was impacting the community. One example of how the ISN

Maskwa CSP's assist in the community is by conducting regular wellness checks and providing direct mental health first aid to those who benefit from additional supports.

Attending Sporting Events – Hockey, Volleyball, etc Moving forward, the Pic Mobert Community Safety and Well-Being plan outlines five community priorities as well as an action plan that will guide the implementation of a sustainable community-based model for the promotion of safety and wellness for the community.
